

TEACHER-COACH EDUCATION PROGRAM The Preparation and Socialization of Teacher-Coaches

RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

- Teachers from diverse backgrounds and content areas are now frequently found within the secondary coaching ranks.
- Novice teacher-coaches may experience some form of inter-role conflict or role overload.
- One of the primary benefits of an integrated Teacher-Coach Education Program (TCEP) is to help bridge the gap between teaching and coaching, academics and athletics in secondary schools.
- TCEP will offer future secondary teacher-coaches a view of teaching and coaching, whereby the two roles are understood in relation to one another and are seen as synonymous.

For educators to be considered effective...they must receive not only the knowledge and skills necessary for each role but also adequate preparation.
